

We bought the oak wall clock a couple of years ago and sent it away to have 30 identical clocks made. Twenty-five will be mahogany, 5 will be oak. The mahogany clock pictured is one of the first ten we received.

We cannot find anything on the new clock that is different from the old one, except the age of the finish. Joe Brewer said he would spend an hour or two rubbing the “new” finish on his case, to make it look older. Personally, it suits me like it is, and I have one hanging in my living room now. If you were to lay any of the parts from the old and the new, side by side, you would not know which was new. The movements, dials, weights, glass jars, pendulums, you name it, all are identical. Long ago I promised my family and a few friends that I would make them one, and other clock buyers have told me to hold one for them.

This clock may be my favorite clock of all the early wall clocks made in this country. I have had several of the originals and sold many for over \$50,000 each. I consider this model to be an investment for my children that will only increase in value in the coming years. The clocks were constructed of the finest materials, finished and polished like any expensive clock. If you want to take the time to rub and polish the wood some more, you can make it look older. The 8 day movement, weight, mercury pendulum, painted metal dial, hands, and everything else, was made identical to the original. Many of our customers have inspected both clocks when they came to pick up their auction purchases, and everyone was amazed that the clocks are identical.

We are not supplying live mercury with the clocks. I have been told that mercury is available on the open market. The original clock came to us with aluminum foil inside the jars, with buckshot added for weight.

Several customers have called asking if I would accept part cash and part trade. I will take any of your nice marketable clocks as part payment. That will be a good way for you to upgrade your collection, and it gives me nice clocks for future auctions. Contact
